



Washington County Pheasants Forever 10th Annual Mentored Youth Pheasant Hunt



September 13, 2014

On Saturday September 13, 2014, Washington County Pheasants Forever Chapter held its 10th Annual Mentored Youth Pheasant Hunt. There were 16 youth participants, ages 12 to 15, who attended the event along with 39 adult volunteers who helped make this event a tremendous success. The sunny, 55 degree weather was perfect for all of our outdoor activities.

Each youth was teamed with a mentor to work with them one-on-one throughout the day's activities. Mentors shared hunting experiences, embraced safety to the youth through many activities including shooting blue rock, the .22 range, learning how to clean shotguns and how to locate downed birds in the field. Dan Roberts our Local Conservation Officer from the Nebraska Game and Parks also instructed youth about Nebraska hunting laws and the proper way to ask a landowner for permission to hunt on their property.

The highlight of the day was a live pheasant hunt that occurred at the farms of Rod & Curt Jensen and Rodney Madsen. The youth, guided by their mentors, experienced a very realistic field hunting experience using bird dogs controlled by a dog handler. This year all youth participants were able to take a shot at a Ring-Neck Pheasant and 75% were successful.

After the events of the day, the Washington County Pheasants Forever Chapter and Wimmer's Meat Products provided lunch for everyone. Those who completed the youth hunt received a hunting vest provided by a joint partnership of Pheasants Forever, Nebraska Game & Parks and Boyt Harness. All in all it was a very successful day full of education, sportsmanship, and fun.

As part of our 10th anniversary PF Chapter celebration, every youth received a Pheasants Forever T-shirt.

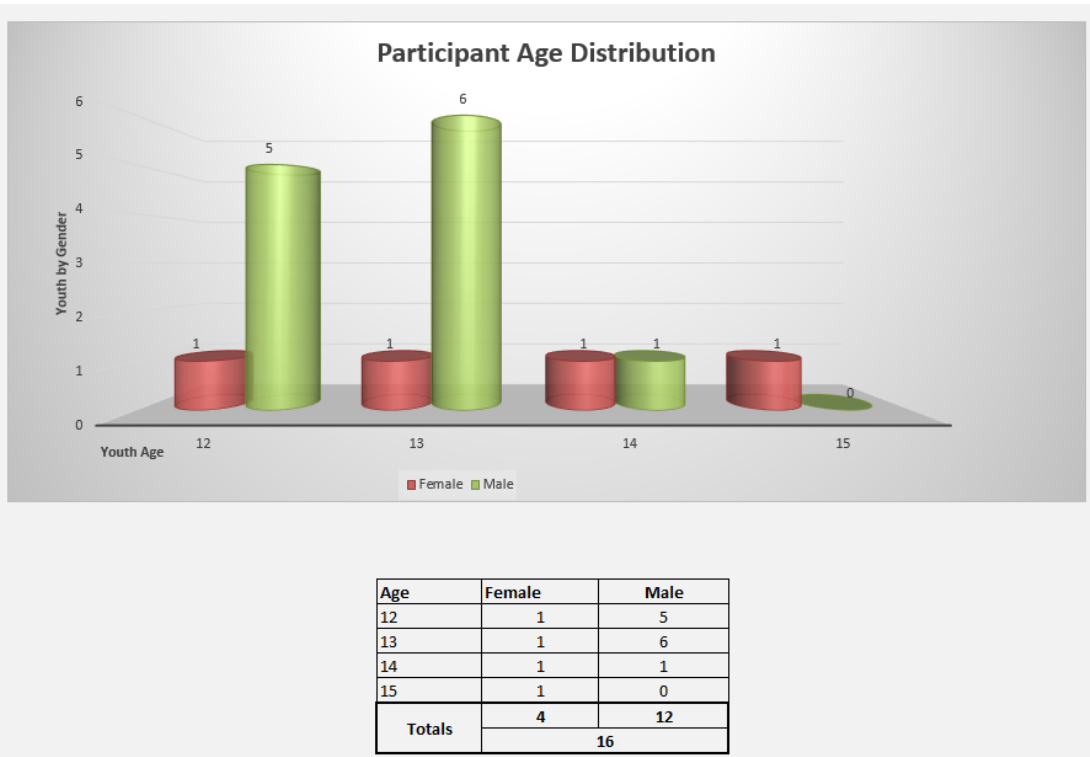


Each of the youth participants were presented a Pheasants Forever and Nebraska Game & Parks donated hunting vest.

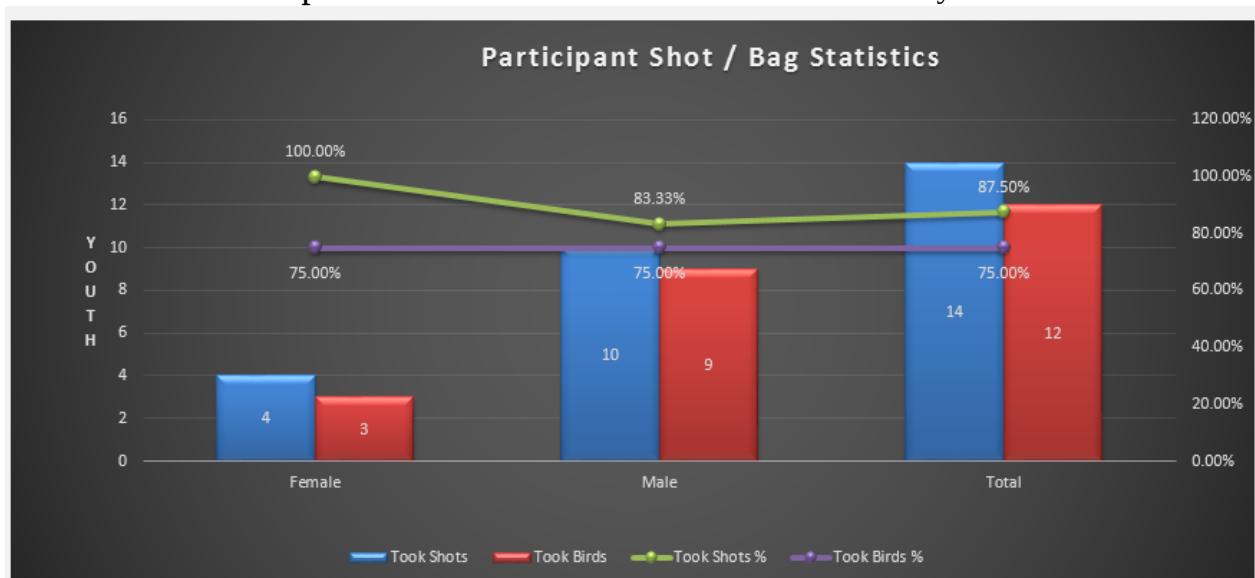


2014 Youth Hunt Statistics

This year's hunt had 16 youth participants, 4 Young Ladies and 12 Young Men ranging from 12 to 15.

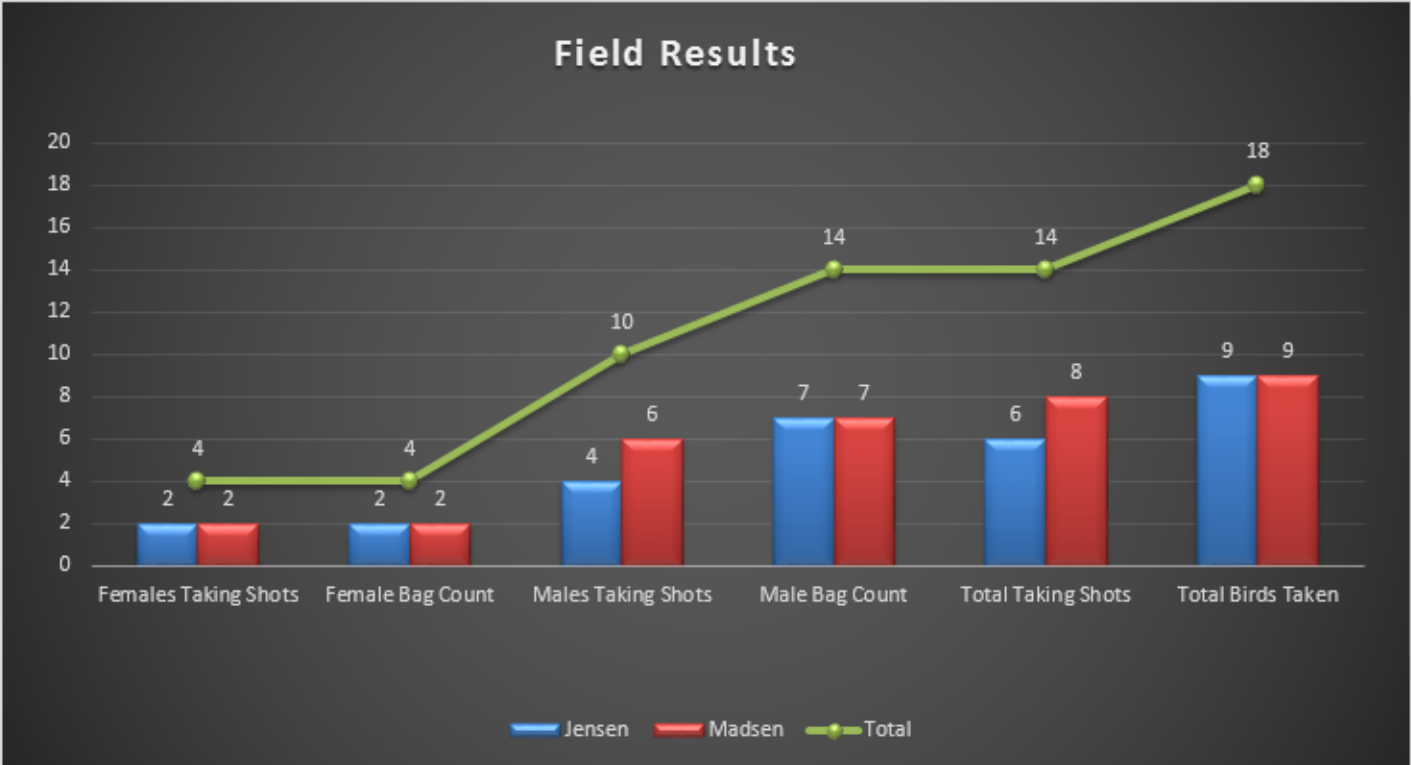


87.5% youth were able to get shots at birds this year and 75% were successful and some took home multiple birds. This was one of our most successful years on record.



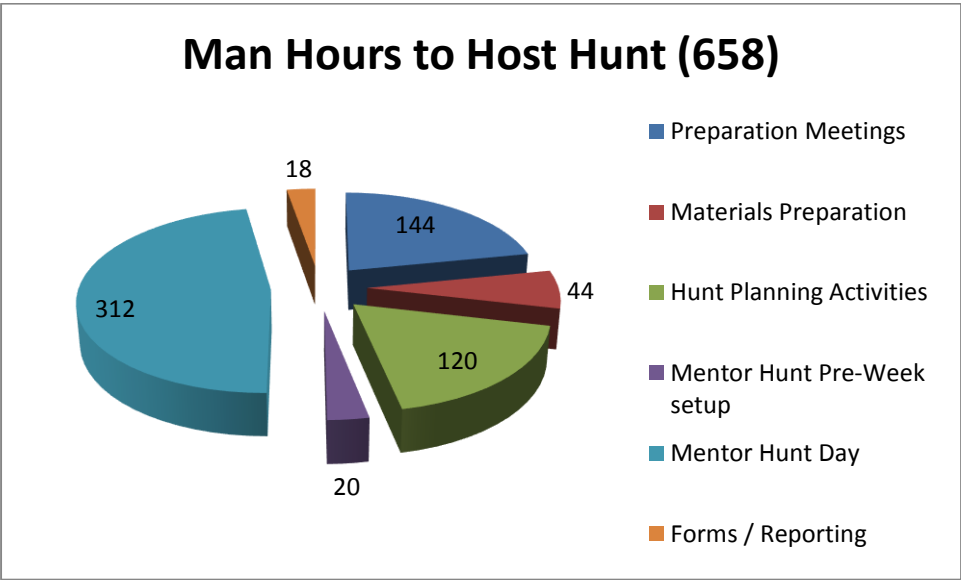

This year we looked at the statistics in more detail examining both of our hunt fields, how many took shots and the bag counts including totals by gender. We can observe that the fields, shots and success rates so we can look for ways to improve next year.

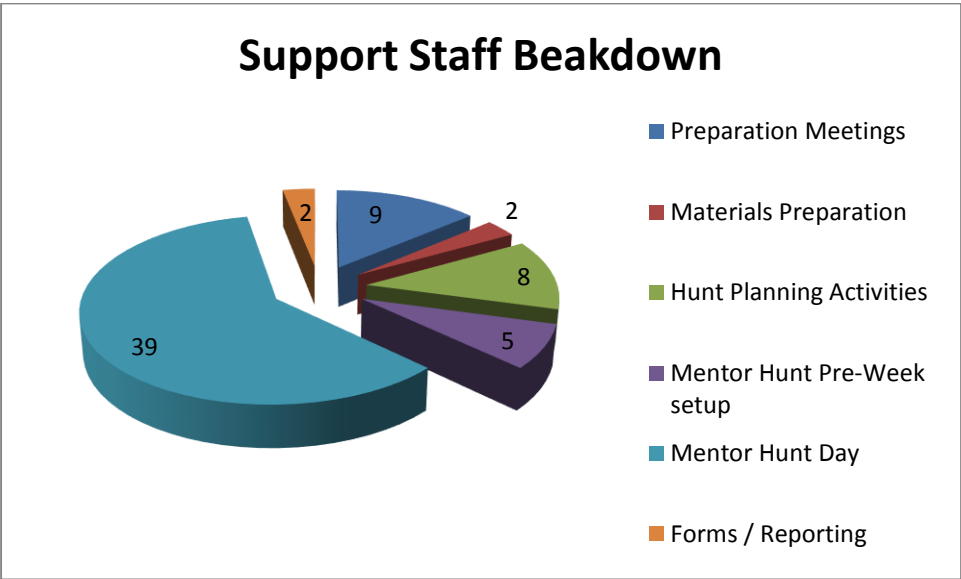

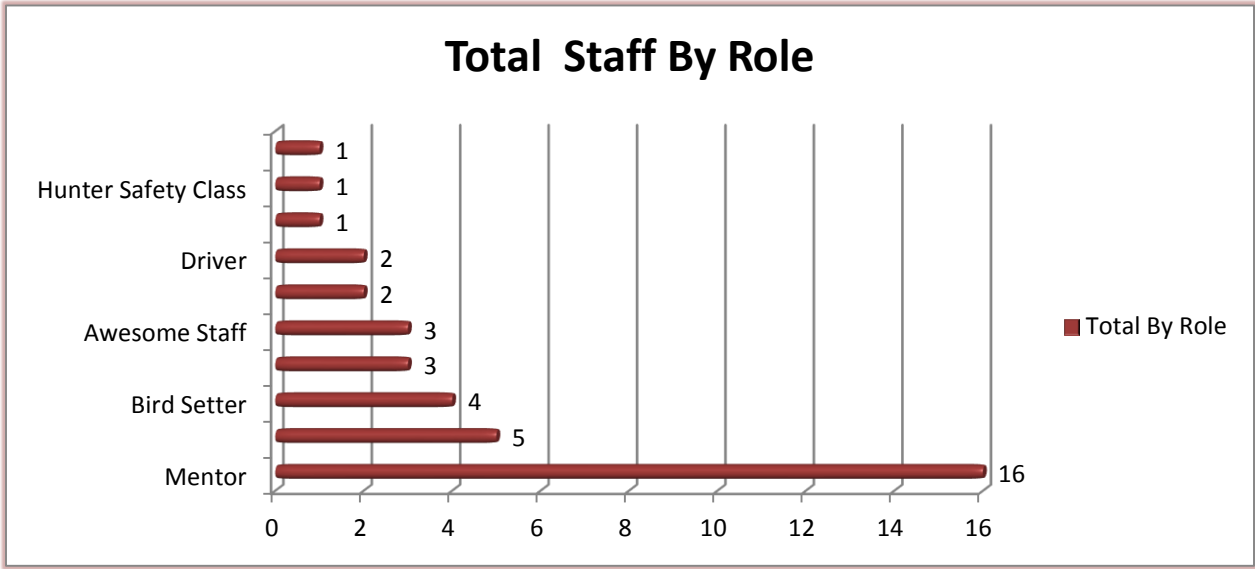
Hosting the annual hunt requires considerable volunteer efforts each year. This year pproximtely 658 hours were invested by 39 volunteers supporting various tasks.

Each annual hunt takes considerable funding. This year pproximely \$5,460.76 was used to accomplish the hunt, 79% from the Washington County PF chapter and 21% in donations from various organizations and individual contributors.
